<u>Iktomi</u> stories (Goble) have students write a story patterned after an Iktomi story

<u>Pigsty</u> (Teague) children write about their own bedrooms (clean or dirty)

<u>Ira Sleeps Over</u> (Weber) children write about sleepovers

<u>Scarecrow</u> (Rylant) children write about the scarecrow they created and the feelings it has

<u>Love That Dog</u> (Creech) use with poetry writing (poetry tells a story)

<u>And the DISH Ran Away with the SPOON</u> (Stevens/Crummel) children write spoofs on nursery rhymes

Monkey Business (Edwards)
A book of idioms!

<u>Dear Mrs. Larue</u> (Teague) Children pretend to be Mrs. Larue and write back to Ike

> <u>The Great Fuzz Frenzy</u> (Stevens/Crummel) Students write new uses for fuzz!

> My Momma Likes to Say (Brennan-Nelson) Children write phrases their moms say

Wallace's Lists (Landstrom) Looks at list-making as a form of writing.
